#### Oldham Council

Oldham residents advised to take extra care during extreme heat. Thursday, 14th July 2022 Oldham residents are strongly advised to take extra care and precautions over the coming days with temperatures set to soar over the weekend and into next week.

An Amber Extreme Heat warning has already been issued by the Met Office and comes into effect on Sunday until Tuesday, with local forecasts predicting highs of up to 35C.

This weather warning is not to be taken lightly, with populationwide adverse health effects likely to be experienced and the latest advice warning of the potential to cause serious illness or a danger to

A Level 3 UK Health Security Agency Heat Health Alert is also in place from Saturday until Tuesday, with people advised to look out for the most vulnerable and those with underlying health conditions.

Heatwaves can affect anyone, but the most vulnerable are at greater risk including people who are older, especially anyone over 75. and those who live on their own or in a care home.

People with a serious or longterm illness are also vulnerable, alongside those who find it hard to keep cool themselves, like babies and young people or people with Alzheimer's disease.

Those who are outdoors for large parts of the day are also at high risk.

Councillor Barbara Brownridge. Cabinet Member for Health and Social Care, said: 'It may be nice to see the sun shining but in anticipation of this extreme heat, now is not the time for us to take this weather lightly and to act irresponsibly.

'These conditions are serious, and they can sadly be life threatening, especially for our most vulnerable residents, so we must ensure those closest to us are okay and have everything they need during this extreme heat.

'Whether it's checking in on our elderly neighbours or helping those who are most vulnerable to keep cool, our actions go a long way in keeping people safe.'

There are plenty tips for coping in this type of weather, including drinking plenty of fluids, applying sunscreen regularly and keeping out of the sun between 11 am to 3 pm.

Avoid exercising during the hottest parts of the day and excess alcohol too, and if you're staying indoors, remember to close your curtains on rooms that face the sun to keep your rooms cooler.

If you need to take a trip somewhere, never leave anyone in a closed, parked vehicle, especially infants, young children or animals.

A common temptation in warmer weather is attempting to cool down in open water but this brings its own risks and should be avoided.

'Swimming in local reservoirs can be extremely dangerous,' Cllr Brownridge added.

'Not only can the cold water shock your body and lead to panic, it can also be very deep and if something was to go wrong, the emergency services may struggle to reach you in time if you are in a remote location.

'Avoid the temptation, act responsibly and stay safe.'

With more residents likely to visit their local parks and green spaces during the warm weather, residents are reminded to respect their nearby surroundings and resi-

This particularly includes our moorland areas, such as Dove Stone Reservoir, the Saddleworth Moors and Crompton Moor, where fires of any kind, including disposable BBQs, are banned and you risk being fined or prosecuted.

Moorland fires, however they are caused, can have devastating consequences for animals, property and the land, so we urge anyone who sees a fire on the moors to ring 999. ■

## **Some Famous Oldhamers**

#### **#73 Philip Gilbert Hamerton**

hilip Gilbert Hamerton (10 September 1834 – 4 November 1894) was a British artist, art critic and author. He was a keen advocate of contemporary printmaking and most of his writings concern the graphic arts. He was an important theorist of the English Etching Revival.

hamlet near Shaw and Crompton. Lancashire, England. His mother died

giving birth to him, and his father died ten vears later. When he was about five, he was sent to live with his two aunts at an estate called the Hollins on the edge of Burnley, where he attended **Burnley Grammar** School.

Hamerton's first literary attempt, a volume of poems, was

unsuccessful, leading him to devote himself for a time entirely to landscape painting; he camped out in the Scottish Highlands, where he eventually rented the former island of Inistrynich in Loch Awe, upon which he settled with his wife Eugénie Gindriez, the daughter of a French republican magistrate, in 1858.

Discovering after a time that he was more suited to art criticism than

painting, he moved to Sens and later to Autun, where he produced his Painter's Camp in the Highlands (1863), which was very successful and prepared the way for his standard work on Etching and Etchers (1866). In the following year he published Contemporary French Painters, and in 1868 a continuation. Hamerton was born at Laneside, a Painting in France after the Decline of Classicism.

He had by now become art critic

to the Saturday Review, which necessitated frequent visits to England, forcing him to give it up. He proceeded in 1870 to establish and edit an art journal of his own, The Portfolio, a monthly periodical, each number of which included of a monograph upon some artist or group of artists, often written by

him. The journal championed printmaking, especially etching. He selected and wrote the accompanying text for Etchings by French and English Artists (London: Seeley, 1874) which included work by Alphonse Legros and Léon Gaucherel. The discontinuation of his painting gave him time for writing, and he successively produced The Intellectual Life (1873), perhaps the best known and most


valuable of his writings; Round my House (1876), notes on French society by a resident; and Modern Frenchmen (1879), admirable short biographies. He also wrote two novels, Wenderholme (1870) and Marmorne (1878).

In 1884 Human Intercourse, another volume of essays, was published, and shortly afterwards Hamerton began his autobiography, which he brought down to 1858. In 1882 he issued a finely illustrated work on the technique of the great masters of various arts, under the title of The Graphic Arts, and three years later another splendidly illustrated volume, Landscape, which traces the in-

fluence of landscape upon the mind of man. His last books were: Portfolio Papers (1889) and French and English (1889). In 1891 he removed to the neighbourhood of Paris, where he died suddenly in Boulogne-sur-Mer, occupied to the last with his labours on The Portfolio and other writings on

In 1896 was published Philip Gilbert Hamerton: an Autobiography, 1834-1858; and a Memoir by his wife, 1858–1894. ■

Sadly, and like many of the most quotable 'last words', Charles' "Let not poor Nelly starve" wasn't actually the last thing he said. His actual dying words, during a lingering demise caused by kidney failure, were:

'You must pardon me, gentlemen, for being a most unconscionable time a-dying'.

The letters they send out look as though they are personal to the recpient. But actually, the message could relate to anyone. For example: 'You are a sincere individual,

but sometimes people just don't understand you'; 'Something has been bothering you lately', 'You are thinking of changing something in your life.'

Some try to persuade people to buy lucky charms, or claim they have messages from beyond the grave. Whatever story they weave, victims will becharged for the clairvoyant's fictitious help. If a payment is made, more lies will follow – the scammer

wants to obtain ongoing payments. Those going through difficult times, or feeling lonely, are more at risk of falling for these types of scams.

#### Remember

☐ Clairvoyant scammers often hide behind stolen photographs. They never disclose their real identity on letterheads.

☐ Some scammers glean genuine information about people by trawling places like social media, networking sites and bereavement notifications.

☐ Just because someone appears to know your business doesn't mean they have special powers.

☐ Don't be tempted to part with cash in return for 'winning' lottery numbers – they are always fake. If you pay out, the only winner will be the scammer.

☐ Any response from you indicates you're interested, even if you don't send cash.

☐ If you respond to a clairvoyant scam letter, you could end up receiving a variety of other postal scams, as postal scammers share victims' information.



If you suspect you have been targeted by a scammer, stop all communication immediately and report it to the dating site.



# This day 3 July in History

1823 – Afro-Chileans are emancipated. 1847 – After 17 months of travel, Brigham Young leads 148 Mormon pioneers into Salt Lake Valley, resulting in the establishment of Salt Lake City. 1847 – Richard March Hoe, American inventor, patented the rotary-type printing press.

**1864 –** American Civil War: Battle of Kernstown: Confederate General Jubal Early defeats Union troops led by General George Crook in an effort to keep them out of the Shenandoah Valley.

**1866 –** Reconstruction: Tennessee becomes the first U.S. state to be readmitted to Congress following the American Civil War.

**1901 –** O. Henry is released from prison in Columbus, Ohio, after serving three years for embezzlement from a bank.

#### What do you remember?

**1910 –** The Ottoman Empire captures the city of Shkodër, putting down the Albanian Revolt of 1910.

**1911 –** Hiram Bingham III re-discovers Machu Picchu, 'the Lost City of the Incas'.

1915 – The passenger ship SS Eastland capsizes while tied to a dock in the Chicago River. A total of 844 passengers and crew are killed in the largest loss of life disaster from a single shipwreck on the Great Lakes.

**1922 –** The draft of the British Mandate of Palestine was formally confirmed by the Council of the League of Nations; it came into effect on 26 September 1923.

**1923 –** The Treaty of Lausanne, settling the boundaries of modern Turkey, is signed in Switzerland by Greece, Bulgaria and other countries that fought in World War I.

**1924 –** Themistoklis Sofoulis becomes Prime Minister of Greece.

**1927 –** The Menin Gate war memorial is unveiled at Ypres.

**1929** – The Kellogg–Briand Pact, renouncing war as an instrument of foreign policy, goes into effect (it is first signed in Paris on August 27, 1928, by most leading world powers).

**1935** – The Dust Bowl heat wave reaches its peak, sending temperatures to 109 °F (43 °C) in Chicago and 104 °F (40 °C) in Milwaukee.

**1937 –** Alabama drops rape charges against the 'Scottsboro Boys'.

1943 – World War II: Operation Gomorrah begins: British and Canadian aeroplanes bomb Hamburg by night, and American planes bomb the city by day. By the end of the operation in November, 9,000 tons of explosives will have killed more than 30,000 people and destroyed 280,000 buildings.

1950 – Cape Canaveral Air Force Sta-

**1950 –** Cape Canaveral Air Force Station begins operations with the launch of a Bumper rocket.

**1959** – At the opening of the American National Exhibition in Moscow, U.S. Vice President Richard Nixon and Soviet Premier Nikita Khrushchev have a 'Kitchen Debate'.

**1963 –** The ship Bluenose II was launched in Lunenburg, Nova Scotia. The schooner is a major Canadian symbol.

**1966** – Michael Pelkey makes the first BASE jump from El Capitan along with Brian Schubert. Both came out with broken bones. BASE jumping has now been banned from El Cap.

1967 – During an official state visit to Canada, French President Charles de Gaulle declares to a crowd of over 100,000 in Montreal: Vive le Québec libre! ('Long live free Quebec!'); the statement angered the Canadian government and many Anglophone Canadians

**1969 –** Apollo program: Apollo 11 splashes down safely in the Pacific Ocean.

1974 – Watergate scandal: The United States Supreme Court unanimously ruled that President Richard Nixon did not have the authority to withhold subpoenaed White House tapes and they order him to surrender the tapes to the Watergate special prosecutor.

#### Where were you?

**1977 –** End of a four-day-long Libyan–Egyptian War.

1980 – The Quietly Confident Quartet of Australia wins the men's 4 x 100 metre medley relay at the Moscow Olympics, the only time the United States has not won the event at Olympic level.

**1982 –** Heavy rain causes a mudslide that destroys a bridge at Nagasaki, Japan, killing 299.

**1983** – The Black July anti-Tamil riots begin in Sri Lanka, killing between 400 and 3,000. Black July is generally regarded as the beginning of the Sri Lankan Civil War.

**1983 –** George Brett playing for the Kansas City Royals against the New York Yankees, has a game-winning home run nullified in the 'Pine Tar Incident'.

**1987 –** US supertanker SS Bridgeton collides with mines laid by IRGC causing a 43-square-meter dent in the body of the oil tanker.

**1987 –** Hulda Crooks, at 91 years of age, climbed Mt. Fuji. Crooks became the oldest person to climb Japan's highest peak.

**1998 –** Russell Eugene Weston Jr. bursts into the United States Capitol

and opens fire killing two police officers. He is later ruled to be incompetent to stand trial.

**1999** – Air Fiji flight 121 crashes while en route to Nadi, Fiji, killing all 17 people on board.

**2001 –** Simeon Saxe-Coburg-Gotha, the last Tsar of Bulgaria when he was a child, is sworn in as Prime Minister of Bulgaria, becoming the first monarch in history to regain political power through democratic election to a different office.

2001 – The Bandaranaike Airport attack is carried out by 14 Tamil Tiger commandos. Eleven civilian and military aircraft are destroyed and 15 are damaged. All 14 commandos are shot dead, while seven soldiers from the Sri Lanka Air Force are killed. In addition, three civilians and an engineer die. This incident slowed the Sri Lankan economy.

**2009 –** Aria Air Flight 1525 crashes at Mashhad International Airport, killing 16.

**2012 –** Syrian civil war: The People's Protection Units (YPG) capture the city of Girkê Legê.

2013 – A high-speed train derails in Spain rounding a curve with an 80 km/h (50 mph) speed limit at 190 km/h (120 mph), killing 78 passengers.

2014 – Air Algérie Flight 5017 loses contact with air traffic controllers 50 minutes after takeoff. It was travelling between Ouagadougou, Burkina Faso and Algiers. The wreckage is later found in Mali. All 116 people onboard are killed. ■
